Founded in 1927 by Anna B. Korn, the Oklahoma Heritage Association (OHA) is dedicated to preserving Oklahoma's incredible history through its most valuable resource—its people. From the mid-1970s through 2006 the OHA was housed in the former home of Judge and Mrs. Robert A. Hefner near downtown Oklahoma City. In May, 2007, the OHA opened its new home, the Edward L. Gaylord-Boone Pickens Oklahoma Heritage Museum in the historic Mid-Continent Life Insurance building, listed on the National Register of Historic Places. A gift from the late Edward L. Gaylord, this historic structure has allowed the OHA to expand its programming and outreach. Holdenville native T. Boone Pickens launched the renovation of the structure.

“I AM OKLAHOMA” CERTIFICATE

The goal of the “I Am Oklahoma” certificate is to encourage young Oklahomans, ages 8-17, to explore their own Oklahoma story through their family, community, and Oklahoma's rich history. With this process will come a sense of pride in being an Oklahoman and celebrating the unique history of our great state.

TO EARN THE CERTIFICATE

Participants will complete the required number of activities in each of the four sections: My Individual Oklahoma Story, My Community Story, the State of Oklahoma Story, and Oklahoma and the World.

STATE SYMBOL ACTIVITIES

All activities to be completed on one of the State Symbol Activity Sheets provided in this packet.

1. Make a list of at least 10 words that best describe you. Create a collage from the words on your list and pictures/illustrations supporting the words you chose.
2. Ask family members to share stories about relatives from different generations. Compare the similarities and differences between the generations.
3. Make a family tree identifying as many generations as possible.
4. The five characteristics of every Oklahoman are individualism, pioneer spirit, generosity, perseverance, and optimism. List the five characteristics and give examples of your actions that personify each one. You may either draw or write your examples.
5. Choose a member of the Oklahoma Hall of Fame, complete list available at www.oklahomaheritage.com, which best demonstrates the characteristics from No. 4. Identify the Hall of Fame member and describe how these characteristics have played a role in the Hall of Fame member's life.
6. Write a paragraph that reflects your philosophy on what it means to be an Oklahoman. Choose a historical figure from Oklahoma's past that best exemplifies your philosophy and explain why.
7. Choose an Oklahoman associated with an occupation that you are interested in pursuing. What personal talents and characteristics did that person have that contributed to his/her success? Explain how your talents and characteristics will help with your career choice.
8. Choose a family member who you believe has made a positive impact on the State of Oklahoma. Give examples of their contributions and the resulting impact on the state.
9. Discuss what you appreciate most about your area of the state and what you have learned from it. (i.e. terrain, natural resources, location, people)
10. As a young Oklahoman, what do you believe has been your most-significant contribution to the state? Explain.

3. What kind of feelings, thoughts, or ideas does your artifact represent? Why?


4. What time or event in your life does the artifact represent? Why is it important to you?

STATE SYMBOL ACTIVITIES

All activities to be completed on one of the State Symbol Activity Sheets provided in this packet.

1. Make a banner or bumper sticker with a motto that relates to the history of your community. Include a symbol that supports your motto. Explain how the motto represents your community.
2. Interview a person who has lived in your community for 25 years or more. Use pages 16 and 17, *I Am an Oklahoma Reporter* and *Oklahoma Community Memories*. Ask questions about what the community was like then and now. Ask them to tell you an exciting or memorable story about a person and/or event in the community.
3. Create a history map showing five historic places in your community. You may draw your own map or print a map from the Internet. You may choose a historical marker, a history or heritage museum, cemetery, monument, historic house, and/or an archaeological site.
4. The State Fair of Oklahoma celebrates unique and special features of Oklahoma each year. What celebrations does your community have to honor its history and heritage? Design a poster informing people of the community celebration.
5. Find a street, building, or park named after someone in your community. Discover why the location was named after this person. Write a brief play about the person's contribution to your community. Include the script in your packet.
6. Draw a community web connecting you to places in your community that are important to you. Places may include the location of club meetings, a place of worship, museum, or school. Place yourself in the middle of the web. Pick one of the connections and give a brief history of the place. Include when it was built, what the place has been used for over time, how it has changed over time, and why it is important to your community and you.
7. Check with your local Chamber of Commerce to find out the anchor businesses and industries in your community. Investigate how people's jobs have changed over the course of your community's history.
8. Advertise a community business. On the top half of your paper, design an advertisement for a business or industry that was a part of your community 50 years ago. On the bottom half, make an advertisement for a current business or industry in your community.

1. Read a story about Oklahoma's early beginnings. Create a bookmark with the main character on one side and his/her contributions and characteristics on the other.
2. Create an illustrated timeline showing five major events in Oklahoma's history that helped shape the identity of your community.
3. How did you become an Oklahoman? Trace your family's arrival in Oklahoma by mapping their route. Include a short paragraph explaining why they came to Oklahoma.
4. Induction into the Oklahoma Hall of Fame is the highest award an Oklahoman can receive from the state. Honorees receive a Hall of Fame Medallion and framed certificate upon their induction. Design an award you believe would best depict this high honor.
5. Choose the governor/lieutenant governor that you believe has made the most significant impact on the State of Oklahoma. Explain.
6. Choose one Oklahoman, living or deceased, that would best represent our state to the world. Who did you choose? Why?
7. Draw or print a map of Oklahoma that outlines the counties. Identify five counties in your region of the state and name an Oklahoman who has contributed significantly to Oklahoma's growth from each. Label each county with the individual's name, hometown, and their contribution.
8. Design an Oklahoma travel brochure that focuses on the three most exciting attractions, chosen by you, in Oklahoma. Provide a photo, the location, and description of each attraction.
9. Oklahoma is known for many industries. Design a poster for the industry you believe makes the largest impact on the state economy.
10. Spell O-K-L-A-H-O-M-A down the left side of the page and list a characteristic of Oklahomans for each letter.

I AM AN OKLAHOMA REPORTER

Oral histories are stories passed on through memory. They are considered primary sources . You are the reporter. It is your job to decide who to interview, what questions to ask, and what you will share in your packet.

ORAL HISTORY TIPS

- Choose a topic.
- Start close to home and find the right person to interview by asking relatives, teachers, adults in your neighborhood, and community leaders. You can expand your search to senior citizen centers, cultural organizations, libraries, and museums.

- Arrange to meet with the person being interviewed at a time and place convenient for him/her.

Always take an adult with you to do the interview.

- Prepare four to six open-ended questions to ask. Open-ended questions allow the person being interviewed to elaborate on a topic. (i.e. What was it like growing up in this community? How has the community changed over the last twenty-five years?)
- If you plan to use a recording device, try it before the interview to make sure it is working properly. Bring batteries, a usable tape, a microphone, and electrical cord with you to the interview.
- If you are writing the responses, make sure you have room after each question for the answer and additional comments.
- Before you begin asking questions, make a note of who you are interviewing, ask him/her to spell their name, the date, place, purpose, and topic so you can complete the top section of page 10, *Oklahoma Community Memories*.
- Limit interview to one hour or less.
- Thank the person you interviewed and follow-up with a thank you note.
